Fisher House turns 10 years old this year and we would love you to celebrate it with us. The Home away from Home for military patients and their families was opened by HM The King on 21 June 2013, whilst he was still HRH The Prince of Wales.

Since Fisher House first opened its doors 10 years ago, we are proud to say we have welcomed over 7,000 families and have provided over 40,000 nights of accommodation.







Fisher House offers a home away from home for injured military personnel, many of whom served in Iraq and Afghanistan and continue to return to the hospital for more surgery, and personnel who are receiving treatment for illness – from cancer care to transplants. Guests have described Fisher House as 'one big hug' and 'a place that takes away all your problems'. It costs the charity £40 a night to host a military family in their time of need.

Staff Sergeant Stuart 'Archie' Gemmell was deployed to Forward Operating Base Wishtan, Helmand. The Royal Engineer had been assigned the job of clearing the surrounding maze of homemade bombs. Soon, he came across a wall with steps chiselled into it. Realising that he would get a good view from the top, he started to climb. The steps gave way and, in an attempt to keep his balance, he stepped backwards, his left foot landing inside a clay bread oven.

At first, nothing happened, but then a deafening explosion ripped through the air. As he lay there waiting for the surrounding dust to settle, he didn't feel any initial pain – only a strange feeling that something had gone badly wrong.

Then he heard a familiar voice: "Archie, keep still. You've lost your leg." Stuart was flown to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham and spent eight weeks in recovery having lost one leg, and sustaining substantial trauma to his other leg, his buttocks and arms. Stuart continues to return to the hospital for ongoing treatment and operations.

His wife Kelly was very thankful that she was able to

stay in Fisher House. Kelly said, "Fisher House was a godsend for me and my girls. We were able to visit Stuart every day and we had somewhere that we could call home for the eight weeks that he was being treated. We stay at Fisher House whenever Stuart comes back for treatment."

Blake Thomas

We would like to dedicate a special mention to one of our longstanding fundraisers, Blake Thomas. Blake very sadly died in December 2022.

Blake had a heart transplant in 2020 and since then fundraised every year along with his family to raise money for the team who looked after him. They've taken on long-distance challenges across the country, with this year being no different. His dad, Mick, is continuing the tradition this year with two more rides planned for the summer. There will be nearly 20



riders altogether completing this challenge in Blake's honour and memory.

His dad, Mick told us, "From a very young age he liked to make people laugh, a fun loving person who was always up to some mischief as a boy. As he grew older, he loved playing football, squash and going cycling. He was passionate about giving back to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham for all they did for him. His last job was a community ambulance driver, which he enjoyed immensely. We'll remember him for his love for his family; he was very close with his nephews and nieces, he was always up for entertaining them."

Solihull Paediatrics team - Rachel

Rachel, who is a matron for paediatrics based at Solihull Hospital and the surrounding community, told us about her experience at Sunrise Snowdon and why she wanted to fundraise:

"We had a great time completing the Sunrise Snowdon event, Sarah and I had taken part in the challenge previously and were keen to go again. Our colleague Kerry and her mum joined us as well as a personal challenge but also to help us fundraise for our service. It was really well organised and although it was hard work and tiring, it was really good fun too - and we saw an amazing sunrise!

"We are always keen to raise money for our Children's Community Nursing service so we can provide additional resources for children with complex and palliative care needs and moderate to severe learning disabilities.

"We have purchased sensory and developmental toys for our support workers to use with them, made 'reminder' fridge magnets of what to take to hospital in an emergency and created 'teddies with tubes' to support children's



understanding of some of the procedures they have to go through. Everything we do is to make their lives a little bit easier, a little bit more fun and a little bit more inclusive. This year we are looking at the Three Peaks Challenge and wondering if our knees can cope."





Lisa Chapman

One of our fantastic fundraisers, Lisa Chapman (centre) and her Granddaughter Harper-Mae, (right) hosted a charity cycle ride last summer and a Christmas party and raised a whopping £5,203.

Lisa wanted the money to go towards the new Transplant Centre at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham, which is one of only two centres in the country to be able to treat four major organ transplants heart, lung, liver and kidney.

Lisa sadly lost her son Josh, when he was 24 years old, after a tragic road accident in 2019. She described him as being the "life and soul of our

family". He leaves behind his daughter Harper-Mae, who was just six months old at the time. However, Josh was a super hero as he was a registered donor and went on to save the lives of six people!

We cannot thank Lisa and her family enough for all they have done. Despite smashing their target, they continue to raise funds to ensure more patients can get the life-saving treatment they need and you can help too, by visiting here:




We have re-launched our Sprinkle Some Magic scheme which allows wards and departments to apply for open funding for items that go over and above what the NHS can provide.

We provide grants from £50 to £1,000 to help Sprinkle Some Magic across our hospitals. This year, staff have chosen to spread joy across the hospitals in many different ways. Take a look...

LED WRITING PADS

As part of our Sprinkle Some Magic scheme, we funded LED writing pads for patients who are hard of hearing to enable better communication between them and the staff caring for them. Quick and effective communication means patients' needs can be assessed quickly, helping them get treated faster and reduce overall wait times.

Our Older Person Assessment Liaison, Clinical Lead Sarah Chamberlain, used the communication board in the A&E department with a 91-year-old who was born deaf. Sarah said, "Although the patient could lip read and use sign language there were parts of the assessment that we were struggling to complete. However, the communication board enabled the assessment to be completed thoroughly and effectively. The patient found the board so useful he wanted to purchase one himself and was so grateful he was able to communicate with staff easily whilst he was with us."



STRICTLY NOT REHAB

UHB Charity funds dance sessions for cardiac rehabilitation patients to help with their recovery.



Lorraine, one of the cardiac rehabilitation volunteers explained the importance of these sessions: "I've been with Strictly Not Rehab since the beginning of the program. Our patients love it as it's also a great social activity for them. Whilst at the sessions,

> they can talk with the medical staff and ask the physios questions. They're all cardiac patients, so by being here together they get to talk to other patients who are in a similar boat to themselves. It's just a really lovely program and we really see the difference it makes to our patients."

One dancer told the hospital charity, "I initially came along to support my husband who was a cardiac patient. It was so helpful to meet the other carers who attend and be able to share my anxieties surrounding his health and talk to people who really understand what I'm going through. Even though my husband has sadly passed away, I keep coming to stay healthy, but also to see my friends."







DEMENTIA SUPPORT

Across our hospitals, 1 in 4 inpatients will have dementia or delirium. To help provide the best medical care for these types of patients, the Sprinkle Some Magic project has provided £1,000 to fund activities for dementia patients. Being in hospital with dementia can be incredibly scary and disorientating.

To help combat this, we have provided jigsaws and dominoes to stimulate their minds and alleviate boredom. For late stage dementia patients, we provide dolls and toy pets, as the sensation of holding a toy baby prompts the patient to instinctively sooth the doll as they would their own child, which in turn calms them.



SENSORY TOYS FOR CHILDREN

We treat thousands of children across our hospital sites every year. It can be a really scary time for them when they arrive for their treatment, so we supplied the play team with some sensory toys to help keep children entertained while they wait. These toys are also great for calming the children down before their treatment, which in turn helps it go as smoothly as possible. We wouldn't be able to fund these items if it wasn't for our fabulous supporters. Even though some of these items may seem small, they can have a huge impact on the experience our patients have in our hospitals.

UHB Charity fund new M

We are thrilled to provide a new state-of-the-art MRI scanner at the new Heartlands Treatment Centre (HTC) which opened this year.

UHB Charity is proud to work with University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust to fund one of two MRI scanners at the treatment centre. The scanners shorten the treatment time and are less claustrophobic; this helps to increase the number of people being seen, reducing waiting times and means less stress for patients and their families. It's also more environmentally friendly!

UHB Charity is also fundraising to decorate the MRI Suite, treatment and consultation rooms with comforting images to create a more relaxing and calming environment for patients and their families, as well as creating a more attractive space for staff to work in.

The brand new £97million Heartlands Treatment Centre's first patient was Richard Mullen from Walmley (pictured cutting the ribbon), who had an MRI scan in the state-of-the-art scanner, funded by UHB Charity.

Cutting a ribbon to mark the occasion, Richard said: "I was referred to the new Heartlands Treatment Centre after an incident at a trampoline park resulting in me hurting my ankle.



"It feels good to be the first person in the new centre here at Heartlands Hospital - I'm honoured!"

WHAT DOES THIS STATE-OF-THE-ART FACILITY OFFER?



- It will treat up to 1,500 patients a day.
- It offers a 'one-stop-shop' for patients as a result of bringing a range of services under one roof, meaning more treatments, for more patients, delivered more efficiently.
- The new centre includes diagnostics, day case procedures, endoscopy, audiology, outpatients, therapies and imaging services.
- State-of-the-art technology has been installed, including brand new theatre suites and advanced imaging equipment.
- The majority of patients will be seen in the new outpatients department, which features multi-language and disabled-friendly self check-in kiosks for patients, along with wayfinding technology on each floor.

Jonathan Brotherton, Chief Executive at University Hospitals Birmingham [UHB], said: "To be able to offer our patients this superb new space and the very best in new technology, alongside the excellent clinical skills and expertise of our staff, is what we have been working towards.

"We hope many patients will benefit from the

Heartlands Treatment Centre for decades to come, and our staff enjoy working in the spacious, bright and purpose-built environment they deserve."



CHILDREN WITH CANCER APPEAL



Every year, around one hundred children are treated for cancer using the radiotherapy machines at the Cancer Centre at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham.

The Paediatric Radiotherapy service provides excellent care for babies, children and young people (up to the age of 24) who require radiotherapy across the Midlands and further afield.

Each child goes through an average of 30 treatments, so to prepare them, UHB Charity provides every child with a Little Linac – a miniature building block set that children can use to build a replica of a radiotherapy machine, CT scanner and MRI scanner that children with a cancer diagnosis would see throughout their treatment.

This encourages children to learn about their treatment through play, building an awareness of the different types of machines, making it less scary. The fantastic thing about the Little Linac is that a child is less likely to choose anaesthesia during their treatment, which can lead to better medical results. It also increases the bond between patient and radiographer, which can lead to a faster recovery. Two-year-old Arlo (pictured above) had radiotherapy last year and was given a Little Linac. His dad, Stephen (pictured left), told us, "You can often feel helpless as a parent in these emotional situations, so to have something to distract Arlo with was amazing. He recognised the Tomotherapy unit (the radiotherapy machine, that looks similar to the image above) from

the Little Linac set when having his treatment, making it less scary for him and less emotional for us. He also took it home to show his family and friends. We're so proud of our brave little man."

Paediatric Specialist Therapeutic Radiographer, Liam Herbert, told us how useful these are when treating children with cancer, "The Little Linacs are great at helping me prepare children for radiotherapy. If a child is nervous, I am able to use the Little Linacs to help familiarise the child with radiotherapy and the machines we use to deliver this important treatment. They often then take these Little Linacs home to build with their family or friends and show off how brave they have been."
